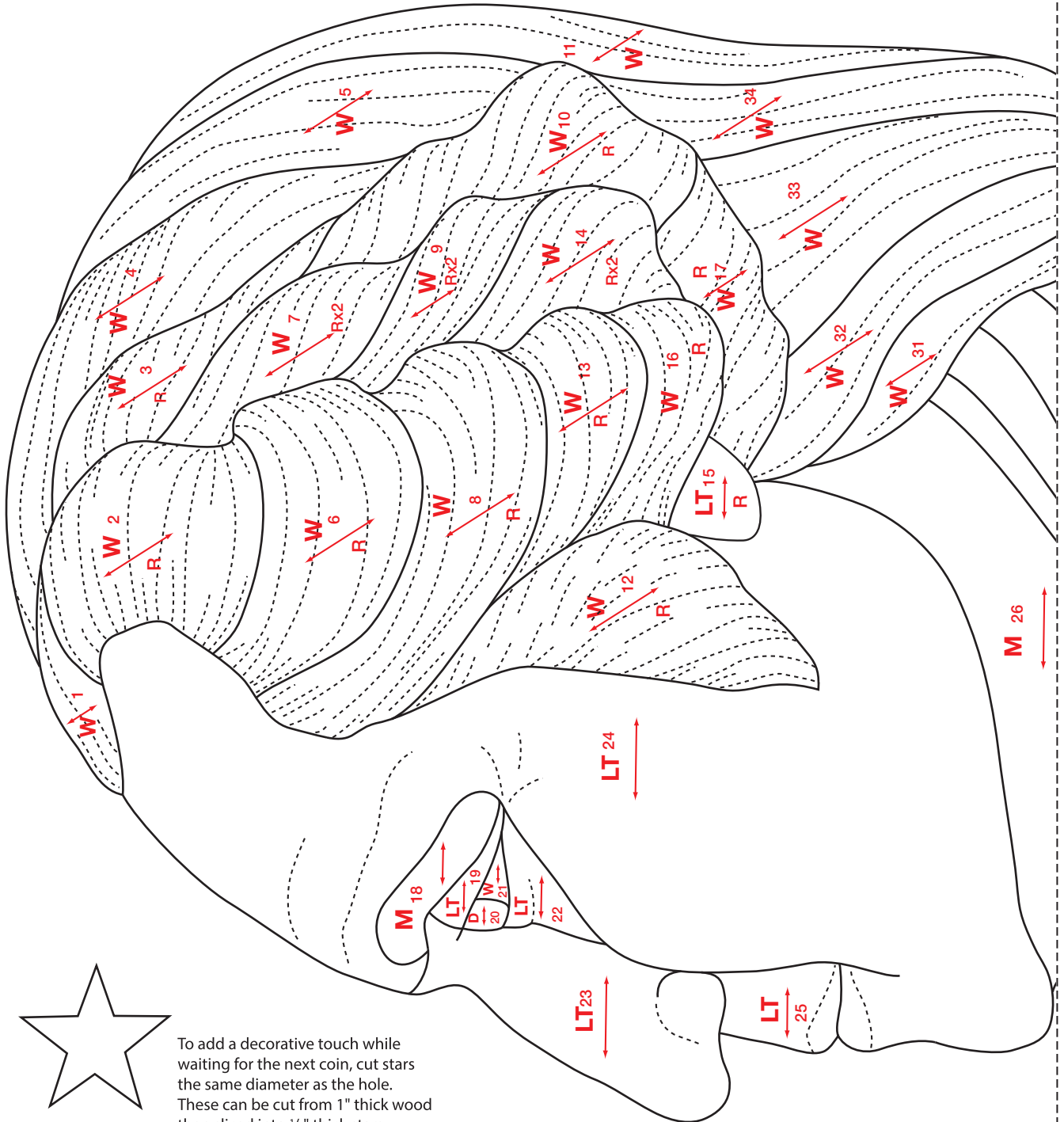


Intarsia George

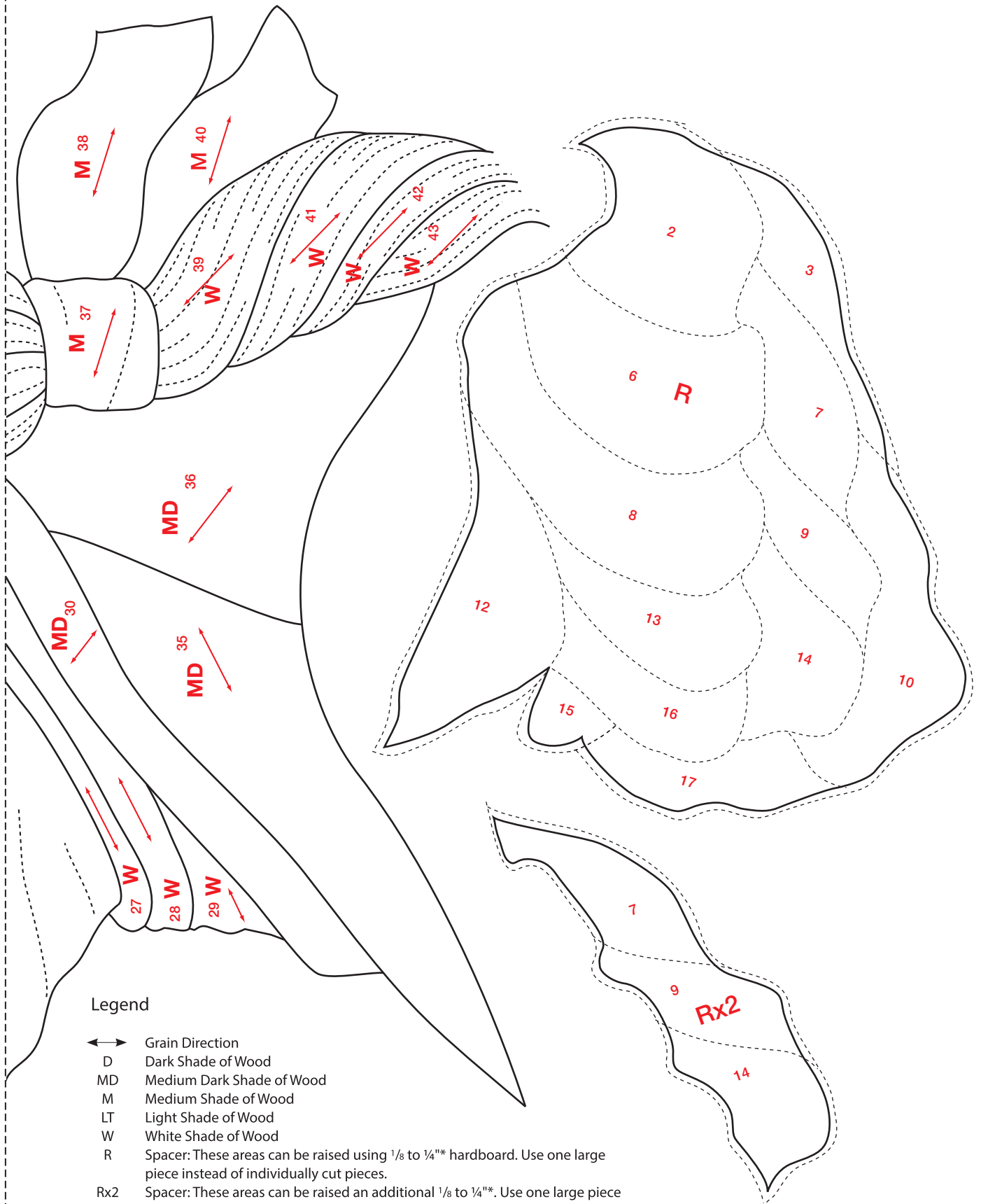
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Use the dashed lines on the pattern as a guide for adding a hair-like texture. I used a Wonder Wheel (see Buying Guide, page 63). You can use a rotary hand tool for a similar effect.

For extra detail you can add some definition to the nose, lips, and wrinkles on the face.



To add a decorative touch while waiting for the next coin, cut stars the same diameter as the hole. These can be cut from 1" thick wood then sliced into 1/8" thick stars.



Legend

- ↔ Grain Direction
- D Dark Shade of Wood
- MD Medium Dark Shade of Wood
- M Medium Shade of Wood
- LT Light Shade of Wood
- W White Shade of Wood
- R Spacer: These areas can be raised using 1/8 to 1/4" hardboard. Use one large piece instead of individually cut pieces.
- Rx2 Spacer: These areas can be raised an additional 1/8 to 1/4". Use one large piece of hardboard instead of individually cut pieces.

*If you are making your project out of 3/4" thick wood, use 1/4" plywood to make the raising shims.
